Dear Parent/Carers,

What a wonderfully busy few weeks we have had in school. There has been such a positive energy around the classrooms, and it has been lovely to see the children throwing themselves into new challenges and opportunities.

A huge thank you to all the children who took part in the **Cotswold Homes 'Design a Bedroom' competition**. The creativity and imagination shown in the designs were outstanding—I am genuinely relieved that someone else has the difficult task of judging first, second and third place! All entries have now been sent to colleagues at Cotswold Homes, and we will update families as soon as we have a confirmed date for their visit to school to announce the winners.

Several weeks ago, we launched this term's **House Public Speaking Competition**. As in previous years, children are invited to speak for two minutes about an age-appropriate area of personal interest—anything from a favourite hobby to an inspiring person or a fascinating fact. This remains an invitational opportunity, with absolutely no expectation that every child must take part. However, it continues to be one of those experiences that beautifully strengthens oracy skills and often reveals a wonderful spark of confidence in pupils who may not always feel self-assured. To give children plenty of time to prepare, we have amended the timeframes, and children will have the opportunity to present to their house on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> February 2026. Three pupils with the highest votes from each house will then compete against one another on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> March during our Celebration Worship which will start at the earlier time of 2.30pm. Parents/ carers and family members in the audience will then be asked to vote for the overall winner.

Earlier this week, we also shared communication about the forthcoming **First Aid workshops**, taking place on **Friday 6<sup>th</sup> February**. Developing pupils' life skills—especially those that have the potential to save a life—is something I am deeply passionate about. Sam: There was a big fire and it burnt the buildings down





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


## Starlings

This term in History our topic is The Bronze Age to the Iron Age. We recapped our prior learning on the Stone Age and discussed how things changed as we went into the Bronze Age. We learnt how bronze was made and watched a video of a bronze sword being crafted.

In history, Owl's class are learning about Edward Jenner and his discovery of the smallpox vaccine. We are studying who Jenner was through a short biography and exploring how his experiment helped protect people from smallpox, as well as his lasting legacy in modern medicine. As part of our learning, we have created an information leaflet about smallpox and wrote a diary entry imagining we were Edward Jenner on the day he vaccinated James Phipps.

"What I found interesting was how people tried to find cures for smallpox and how they used to treat illnesses in the past." Albert.






